


AP SMITH

Captain Crooke's Steward

AP Smith was born in Tunbridge Wells, England, on the 16th January 1890. He joined HMS Caroline on 4th December 1914 and remained Captain Crooke's personal steward until 31st March 1917. Prior to joining HMS Caroline he was a waiter. He joined the Royal Navy only to serve during the First World War. AP Smith was 5ft 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches tall, with brown hair and grey eyes.

GEORGE BATEMAN

Staff Surgeon

George Bateman joined HMS Caroline on the 24th November 1914 and was on board at the Battle of Jutland on the 31st May 1916.

A staff surgeon was a trained medical professional and a senior member of the ship's company in the medical branch.

His cabin is located near the captain's cabins. His rank of staff surgeon means he would have served in the Royal Navy for more than 20 years.

WILLIAM CRICK

Boy Telegraphist



Born on the 1st January 1899 at East Molesey, Surrey. William Crick joined HMS Caroline's crew in 1915 and he served at the Battle of Jutland on the 31st May 1916.

He began his career in the Royal Navy as a boy telegraphist, rising to the position of telegraphist on the 5th April 1917. He eventually reached the position of signalman. Crick played the violin in HMS Caroline's string band. He kept a diary throughout his time on HMS Caroline.

FREDERICK SAMUEL YOUNG

Cook's Mate

Frederick Samuel Young's birth certificate states he was born on the 16th April 1891 in Sussex. His Royal Navy service records list his birth date as 16th April 1893.

He was trained as a butcher and joined the Royal Navy on the 18th May 1914. He joined HMS Caroline's crew as 2nd class cook's mate on the 3rd May 1914, rising to become cook's mate on the 18th March 1915. He passed his first aid examination while on HMS Caroline on the 6th July 1916.
