CELLS LOWER DECK

The Cells were used for Men who had committed serious Crimes. A common punishment was picking old Rope to pieces (this was called picking Oakum). There is also a Birch Rod for alternative punishment.

How would you feel if you were locked up in a Cell?

LOOK for the Sail Room opposite the Cells.

STOKE HOLD ORLOP DECK

The Men who worked here were called Trimmers and Stokers. The Trimmers brought the Coal from the Bunkers and the Stokers fed it into the Furnaces. It was extremely hot, noisy and dirty! What do you think it would be like to work down here?

Warrior has **10** Boilers and each Boiler has **4** Furnaces – how many is that altogether?



LOOK OUT for the material in here – nothing is made of Wood. Why do you think that is?

HANDLING ROOM ORLOP DECK

The Gunpowder was passed through here from the Powder Magazine below to the Gun Deck. The leather Cartridge cases were used for Gunpowder charges.

Can you see the Candle Lamps on the outside? Why do you think they are not inside the room?



LOOK OUT for the hand passing up the Powder Bags!



SCHOOL TRAIL

Use this Trail to help you explore the Victorian Marvel that is HMS Warrior.



Keep your Eyes peeled and your Wits about you to answer questions and discover what a Day in the Life of a Sailor onboard was like.

HMS Warrior is a hands-on Ship – we encourage you to use all your Senses to explore. You will also come across Victorian Crew who you can talk to!



DON'T FORGET to keep an Eye out for some hidden things highlighted by the Magnifying Glass symbol.

This Trail is best used with the Deck Guide – available when you visit HMS Warrior.

UPPER DECK

Warrior has **3** Masts – the Foremast, Mainmast and the Mizzen and there are **2** Funnels. The Funnels could be lowered (and the Propeller raised) when the Engine was not in use.

Sailors would work in bare feet for better grip.

Can you imagine how you would feel all the way at the top of the Mast?

LOOK OUT for the metal strips on the Deck. These are called “Racers” and are for moving the Guns around.

CAPSTAN MAIN DECK

This was used for raising the Anchor and the “Stanchions” (metal poles) around the Capstan could be lifted out of the way. The wooden bars were slotted in place for the Sailors to push against to turn the Capstan. It took them over **4** Hours to raise the Anchor! Each of Warrior’s **4** Anchors weighed about **5.6** Tons.

There are **8** wooden bars and **11** Sailors would fit on each bar. How many Sailors did it take to raise the Anchor?

LOOK for the other Capstan on the Gun Deck.

GALLEY MAIN DECK

This is the kitchen on the Ship. Sailors would take it in turns to do the cooking. Sailors ate stew for lunch, with beef or pork. Which would be your favourite? Why?

Can you see the iron pans? Iron is a great conductor of heat, so it makes a great saucepan!

Sit down at one of the Mess Tables. Think about how hard it would be to eat dinner if the Ship was in a stormy sea!

LOOK OUT for the giant Cooking Pots in the Galley – do you think you would fit in one?

HALF DECK

Only Officers would be allowed on this Deck. A Marine with a Gun would be stationed on the door to make sure no ordinary Sailors snuck through!

Look at the Captain’s Cabin. Would you like to be Captain?

There are **2** “Pistol Crocuses” (stands) with Pistols on. Each one has **16** Pistols. How many Pistols are there?

LOOK OUT for the Officers’ Toilet in the corner.

WARDROOM LOWER DECK

This was the Mess for the Ship’s other Officers. The Captain had to be invited by the Officers before he could come in! Are the Cabins like your bedrooms? What is the same or different? You can try one out.

The Paymaster was paid the highest wages of anyone – **£366** per Year. How much is that per Day?

LOOK OUT for pictures of Queen Victoria & Prince Albert.

GUNROOM LOWER DECK

This is where the Junior Officers and Midshipmen spent their time. Some would have joined the Navy when they only **14**. They spent their time learning how to be Officers, including how to navigate the Ship.

Sailors used the Stars to help them navigate. Do you know any Star Constellations?

LOOK OUT for the Sextant – this is used to help find your position at Sea.

BATHROOM FLAT

Boy Seamen and the Men who worked in the Boiler and Engine Rooms used the Baths. The rest of the Crew – each Mess of **14** Men – had two Buckets of cold Water twice a week to wash in! Imagine the state of the Water!

Warrior was the first ship to have Washing Machines. Are they like yours?

LOOK OUT for the spare Propeller Blade hiding in here!
